Directions: 285 Pawling Avenue Troy, NY 12180

- *From 90 get on 787 North (or from 87...)*
- *Take Route 7 EAST toward Bennington. Cross Hudson River.*
- *RIGHT on 8th Street (First light after you cross the Hudson) and go till the road ends in a T.*
- *LEFT on Congress St. (Also Route 2)*
- *RIGHT on Route 66 where it splits from Route 2. (Also Pawling Avenue)*
- *Go ~1 miles South on Pawling to see castle-like school on left. Big iron gate. Enter and park to the right or left. Walk toward central campus.*
- *Find Slocum Hall: from the middle of the quad – it is the building to the left (south) of the flag pole with large stained-glass bay windows.*
- *The building is shaped like an "L" and the great hall is on one end of that L, closest to the flag pole.*
